

Men and PrEP

Global data shows that men living with HIV, in all their diversity, are less likely than women to know their HIV status, less likely to initiate ART, less likely to remain engaged in care, and less likely also to be virally suppressed. Oral pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) is recommended under one of the five key HIV prevention pillars and a prevention option for people at substantial risk for HIV infection. Providing access to PrEP is one of the five strategies to meet global targets to reduce the number of new HIV infections to under 370 000 by 2025. However, even after more than a decade since the first efficacy evidence for oral PrEP was reported PrEP uptake globally has been inadequate, and global PrEP targets have been missed. A further, look into PrEP data indicates that access to PrEP is still highly concentrated in a fairly small number of countries and, even within countries with widespread PrEP access, inequalities have emerged. Overcoming PrEP scale-up barriers will require further efforts to understand and address them first. This webinar will focus on men and PrEP.


